

#### Some Spiritual Thoughts....

One of the most direct roads to God is our neighbour.

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It is better to be less perfect while remaining in unity with our neighbour than to be more perfect but in disunity. Because perfection does not lie in ideas or in wisdom but in love.

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We have to see one another the way God sees us, not out to criticise and condemn, but filled with mercy and ready to help one another.

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Those who assist the sick should be like Angels whose efforts go unnoticed but who are missed when they are not around. This is the trait of love.

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#### PERFECT CONTRITION AND SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

What to do if you cannot go to Confession or Holy Communion due to the COVID-19 coronavirus:

If you have to self-isolate or are quarantined, you will be unable to receive the sacraments as normal. In these circumstances, there are devotions through which you can receive absolution for your sins (under certain conditions), and the consolation of Eucharistic grace.

The following devotions are officially encouraged by the Church and have been practised by saints.

#### **How to make an Act of Perfect Contrition**

Through an act of Perfect Contrition, you receive pardon for your sins outside of confession, even mortal sins, on condition that you are determined to amend your life and make a firm resolution to go to sacramental confession as soon as this becomes possible for you.

Perfect Contrition is a grace from God, so sincerely ask for this gift throughout the day prior to making you act of contrition: 'My God, grant me perfect contrition for my sins.'

- 1. In reality or imagination kneel at the foot of the crucifix and say to yourself: " Jesus, my God and my Saviour, in the midst of your agony, you remembered me, you suffered for me, you wished to wipe away my sins"
- 2. Contrition is 'perfect' if you repent your sins because you love God ans are sorry for having offended Him and causing the sufferings of Christ on the cross. Before the Crucified Christ remember your sins, repent of them because they have bought our Lord His sufferings on the cross. Promise him that with His help, you will not sin again.
- 3. Recite, slowly and sincerely, an act of contrition focussed on the goodness of God and your love of Jesus: "O my God, because You are so good, I am very sorry that I have sinned against You and by the help of Your grace I will not sin again. Amen."
- 4. Make a firm resolution to goo to a sacramental confession as soon as practically possible.

#### **How to make a Spiritual Communion**

The key to Spiritual Communion is to grow in your heart a constant desire for the Blessed Sacrament.

- 1. If you are aware of serious or mortal sin, make an Act of Perfect Contrition
- 2. Imagine the sacred words and actions of the Mass or watch online or on TV.
- 3. Make all those acts of faith, humility, sorrow, adoration, love and desire that you usually express before Holy Communion.
- 4. Desire, with earnest longing, to receive our Lord present Body, Blood, soul and Divinity in the Blessed Sacrament,
- 5. Say this prayer of St. Alphonsus de' Ligouri: "My Jesus, I believe You are present in the Blessed Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire You in my soul. Since I cannot now receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. As though You are already there, I embrace You and unite myself wholly to You; do not let me ever be separated from You, Amen."
- 6. After moments of silent adoration make all those acts of faith, humility, love, thanksgiving and offering that you usually express through prayers after Holy Communion.

The Coronavirus, COVID-19 pandemic is not only affecting the way we take care of the living, but also how we take care of our dead. Without as doubt it has certainly been a challenging time for Undertakers, Funeral Homes and families alike – trying to come up with creative, yet very safe, to serve families. Since the cancellation of public Masses as a COVID-19 precaution, Undertakers and Crematoriums have been challenged with creating services that are respectful, faith-based and don't involve a group of more than six – the limit set by health officials.

Here at St. Teresa's, we have been offering a Requiem Mass on-line. This has been a great help to families. Extended family, friends and parishioners have been able to come together in prayer. We had three funerals this week and two last week. Being able to see the Mass on-line has been a great consolation. Family and friends have tuned in from all around the world: Bolivia, Ireland, Australia, India, Malta, Italy, Spain, Poland, Jersey and many different places in America. Here in the U.K. it has been a blessing for those not able to travel or attend because of health and age reasons.

The restrictions on crowd size – and for Catholic families, the absence of Holy Mass and the chance to receive the Body and Blood of Christ has been heart breaking. Not being able to hug and console one another at Church or at the Cemetery has not been easy for many. Celebrating a Requiem Mass on livestreaming will help. I will do my very best to make it a special Mass for all the family.

The death of a loved one is always heart breaking. Organising a funeral, learning that it might be four to six weeks, is not easy to deal with. As a parish we support in prayer the family every step of the way. We have three funerals booked for the early days of May and waiting to hear details of three others. We will bless their souls in the prayer of our Masses.

#### The Pope Prays for Teachers and Students Adapting to On-Line Learning

Pope Francis prayed for teachers and student who are trying to adapt and do their work online during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Let us pray today for teachers who have to work so hard in order to do lessons on the internet and other media" the Pope said on April 24<sup>th</sup> at the beginning of his early morning Mass.

"Let us also pray for students who have to take their exams in a way they are not used to," he said.

In his homily at the Mass, which was live streamed from the Chapel of his residence, Pope Francis looked at how Jesus was always teaching his Apostles to be servants who are never afraid to be close to the people and to give them concrete assistance.

"Jesus loved being in the middle of the crowd" because, in addition to being the best way to serve them, it was "a symbol of the universality of redemption," said the Pope. But the crowd was "one of the bigger things that the Apostles did not like," he said, because they wanted to be "close to the Lord, to hear the Lord, to hear everything the Lord said."

The Apostles' attitude was understandable he said, because "they were chosen and they felt a bit (like) a privileged few, a privileged class an 'aristocracy,' let's say, close to the Lord and the lord did things to correct them so many times."

For example, he said, when Jesus got angry with the Disciples who were trying to turn the children away from him for fear of them being a nuisance or the time on the road to Jericho when the beggar was told to be silent, but Jesus anted him to be brought near.

Jesus was always teaching and showing his disciples to be close to the people of God, the Pope said.

"It is true the people of God tire out a pastor, he gets tired," he added, and the better the priest is at doing good things for people, the more they will keep knocking and asking for help.

The people of God are always asking for things that are concrete, he said. Sometimes they are wrong in what they ask for, like how after Jesus fed the multitude, as told in the day's Gospel reading, they wanted to make him a King, he said.

But they are always asking for something concrete, and, in the reading, Jesus tests the disciples by asking them where they could go to buy enough food for all the people who gathered around them, the Pope said.

Essentially, he was telling them it was their responsibility to get the people something to eat, which is the same thing Jesus is saying to priests today, Pope Francis said.

"You give (the people) something to eat. Are they in distress? You give them consolation. Have they gone astray? You give them a way out. Have they made a mistake? You give them something to solve their problems. You give them something" is the recurring lesson, he said.

"The power of the Shepherd is service, he has no other power and when he mistakenly assumes another power, he ruins his vocation, and becomes, I don't know, a manager of pastoral enterprises, but not a shepherd," Pope Francis said.

The pastoral dimension is not found in the "structures," but rather in the heart of the priest, he said.

"Let us pray today to the Lord for the shepherds of the Church, that the Lord always speaks to them because he loves them so much."
